The demolishing has also caused severe and dangerous psychological effects of prisoners' families' especially children

2 Martyr prisoners since the beginning of 2023 due to medical negligence:

The prisoner Ahmad Abu-Ali.

The prisoner Khader Adnan who was deliberately assassinated after 86 days of hunger strike.

- 11 Corpses of martyr prisoners remain detained
- 700 ill prisoners including:
 - 24 Prisoners suffering from different levels of cancer and tumours Prominently Walid Daqqa who has been arrested for 38 years and is suffering from a rare type of spinal cord cancer.

Also, the prisoner Assef Rifai who was arrested in september 2022.

Mohammed Khalil, the oldest prisoner in confinement as he remains in solitary confinement for more than 15 years now.

Nael Barghouthi who is serving the longest sentence in the history of the Prisoners' Movement, spending a total of 43 years in prison, 34 continuous years among the.
